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CALL TO ORDER
INVOCATION
PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE.

Chairman Kyger called the meeting to order at 3:02 p.m.

Supervisor Wolfe-Garrison provided the Invocation and County Attorney Thomas H. Miller, Jr. led the Pledge of Allegiance.

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INTRODUCTION OF STUDENTS.

Students from Eastern Mennonite High School introduced themselves to the Board.

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APPROVAL OF MINUTES.

On motion by Supervisor Wolfe-Garrison, seconded by Supervisor Chandler, and carried by a vote of 5 to 0, voting recorded as follows: BREEDEN – AYE; CHANDLER

– AYE; KYGER – AYE; TRUMBO – AYE; WOLFE-GARRISON – AYE; the Board approved the minutes of the regular meeting of February 26, 2020.

Administrator King informed the Board of an error in the January 22, 2020 minutes under Appointments. The minutes indicated Supervisor Trumbo was appointed as the County's Chief Local Elected Official (CLEO) Consortium Board member on the Shenandoah Valley Workforce Investment Board, but the actual action was to appoint Supervisor Wolfe-Garrison as the Board member on the Shenandoah Valley Workforce Investment Board. Administrator King asked that the Board take action to appoint Supervisor Wolfe-Garrison as the County's Chief Local Elected Official (CLEO) Consortium Board member on the Shenandoah Valley Workforce Investment Board, effective January 22, 2020.

On motion by Supervisor Chandler, seconded by Supervisor Breeden, and carried by a vote of 5 to 0, voting recorded as follows: BREEDEN – AYE; CHANDLER – AYE; KYGER – AYE; TRUMBO – AYE; WOLFE-GARRISON – AYE; the Board appointed Supervisor Wolfe-Garrison as the County's Chief Local Elected Official (CLEO) Consortium Board member on the Shenandoah Valley Workforce Investment Board, effective January 22, 2020.

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TRANSPORTATION DEPARTMENT.

The Board heard Mr. Komara's report on the activities of the Transportation Department, including the following updates to bridge, road and rural rustic projects:

- The Bicycle/Buggy lane extension work along John Wayland Highway (Route 42) from Dayton to just before the Wal-Mart will begin in April. A & J Development & Excavation, Inc. should take four to five weeks to work on the southbound lane, then work will be performed on the northbound lane.
- There will be spot closures for pipe to be installed for the realignment of the I-81, Exit 245 northbound off ramp to intersect with Port Republic Road (Route 253) directly across from the Forest Hill Road intersection.
- Mr. Komara reminded the Board of the public hearing for the bridge replacement project on Smithland Road (Route 720) scheduled for Thursday, March 26, 2020, from 4-6 p.m., at the VDOT Harrisonburg Residency Office.
- Rural rustic road improvements include cutting trees, grinding stumps, installing pipes, moving fences and stockpiling stone.
- Mr. Komara noted letters were sent to residents on Williamsburg Road (Route 782) and Swope Road (Route 736), where VDOT placed stakes. VDOT staff is starting to meet with landowners about next year's road project.
- Maintenance items include cutting brush, building shoulders, spot grading, adding stone on gravel roads, working on rock outcroppings, and using safety funds to improve the intersection of Rushville Road (Route 736) and Limestone Lane (Route 737). VDOT also cut down approximately 50 ash trees along Brocks Gap Road (Route 259) from Lairs Run Road (Route 921) to Bergton Road (Route 820).

Mr. Komara noted that Administrator King received a letter about special use hauling vehicles for poultry. A Federal mandate has been placed on VDOT structures because trucking industries continue to add axles to trucks so they can haul more weight. Many companies are not spreading out the weight so the weight is focused toward the center of the truck, resulting in a lot of weight remaining on the bridge between the spans. This causes structural concerns for VDOT staff, and several bridges have been posted with weight limits. There will be weight limits posted on three bridges on Brocks Gap Road (Route 259). During a recent meeting Mr. Komara attended, live haul and feed haulers indicated they have not noticed postings on bridges, but they are obtaining overload permits to haul five tons over the limit on every load. Since VDOT made an agreement with the Federal Highway Administration to post the bridges by September 2020, VDOT

staff are preparing maps to help truck drivers navigate to their destination without placing too much weight on posted bridges.

In response to a question from Supervisor Wolfe-Garrison, Mr. Komara indicated the State Police are the enforcement agents for weights and measurements. He explained that there are weight limits on bridges based on the number of axles on the truck as the weight is spread out over those axles. However, newer trucks have additional axles in the belly of the truck that increase the weight. Since the spread is not different, the weight is more concentrated in the middle of the structure.

Administrator King noted that additional axles help with pavement issues, but not when the entire weight of the truck is on a bridge.

In response to a question from Supervisor Wolfe-Garrison, Mr. Komara confirmed this is a routing issue for companies because the only way to get from one location to another may be by traveling across bridges that are not built to hold the weight of the truck. Mr. Komara stated VDOT is working with trucking companies to locate alternate routes. Approximately five bridges on secondary routes and five on primary routes in Rockingham County are not built to carry the of weight trucks crossing them, Mr. Komara said.

Supervisor Wolfe-Garrison reminded Mr. Komara to clear debris from the bicycle and buggy lanes on Route 42 north and south of the City limits. She also reported that a large pothole on Mt. Clinton Pike (Route 726) near Gemeinschaft Home needs to be repaired.

Supervisor Wolfe-Garrison indicated she received a phone call about a guardrail that was down on Rorrer Circle (Route 1144) near Rawley Pike (Route 33 West), but the guardrail has since been replaced. She wondered if that was a VDOT project. Mr. Komara was unaware of it, but said he would investigate.

Supervisor Trumbo said he and Mr. Komara met with Broadway Town Manager Kyle O'Brien regarding a base failure on East Lee Street (Route 259) in the Broadway town limits, which Mr. Komara believes may be a water issue. VDOT will try to determine what is transpiring.

Supervisor Chandler informed Mr. Komara that in Port Republic, a sign is down that reads Point Road and Main Street (Route 605). There is also a reflector laying against a tree on Water Street (Route 1605) at the other end of the Village.

Chairman Kyger asked about the process to move postal boxes from one side of Airport Road (Route 727) to the opposite side of the road where houses are located, to eliminate a safety issue. Mr. Komara said he will initiate that conversation.

Chairman Kyger talked with a gentleman who indicated the U.S. Forest Service has no problem posting Tilghman Road (Route 902) with a 25-mile per hour speed limit since it is a gravel road. Chairman Kyger asked Mr. Komara and Sheriff Hutcheson if the County can post a speed limit on a federal road and whether a speeding violation on that road can be enforced in traffic court. Sheriff Hutcheson responded that he did not think that was possible. Supervisor Kyger suggested discussing that possibility with the U.S. Forest Service Ranger in Bridgewater and obtaining a signed agreement, if the Forest Service is in agreement with the County posting and enforcing a speed limit.

Chairman Kyger indicated ailanthus altissima or trees of heaven are growing back, and spotted lanternfly have been seen in Shenandoah County. He asked that VDOT cut down as many trees of heaven as possible when they are cleaning brush. The spotted lanternfly affects fruit-bearing trees and grapevines, Chairman Kyger said.

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U. S. CENSUS.

Chairman Kyger stated April 1, 2020 is an important day (Census Complete Count Day). By April 1st, County citizens should receive a card from the U.S. Census Bureau with an identification number assigned to their address. He noted every person needs to be counted and encouraged citizens to complete the Census on-line. If they do not have access to a computer or internet, they can either call the Census Bureau hotline, or visit a local library or high school to access a computer and complete the 12 questions, which should take 10 to 12 minutes. He noted every person needs to be counted as \$20,000 in federally-funded programs will be awarded to the County over a 10-year period for each person counted in a household. Those funds will help pay for schools, fire and rescue services, police protection, roads, libraries and many other services needed.

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INTENT TO ADOPT – ARTICLE XI OF CHAPTER 11, “INOPERABLE VEHICLES” OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF ROCKINGHAM COUNTY.

Deputy Zoning Administrator Kelly Getz pointed out there have been misunderstandings about the proposed Inoperable Vehicles Ordinance, because body shops, car shops and auto dealers are exempt from the ordinance. Most complaints received in the zoning office are regarding inoperable vehicles. He noted that the zoning ordinance defines three or more inoperable vehicles as an automobile graveyard. Mr. Getz explained that when there is a violation of the zoning code, a Notice of Violation is sent to the citizen or citizens involved. This results in the County Attorney’s Office filing a Motion with the Circuit Court, requiring court hearings. Mr. Getz believes the proposed ordinance would be a more efficient way of dealing with inoperable vehicles. Many localities in Virginia have adopted similar ordinances, and Albemarle and Augusta Counties have had a similar ordinance in effect for several years, Mr. Getz said.

Mr. Getz indicated inoperable vehicle enforcement is complaint driven. When a complaint is made, staff works with the person in violation by determining if the individual is currently working on the vehicle, when the work will be finished, and if the vehicle can be moved or covered in the meantime.

Mr. Miller indicated he was informed that there was a statute passed in the 1970s and used in the 1980s regarding inoperable vehicles, but neither he nor the person who informed him of the statute has been able to locate the citation. He said Title 15.2 refers to inoperable vehicles and delegated authority. If a previous statute is located which is contradictory to Title 15.2, Mr. Miller said he would review it and determine if a change should be made to the ordinance.

Chairman Kyger informed those in attendance that the inoperable vehicle ordinance was not scheduled as a public hearing. Due to the nature of telephone calls Board members received, he thought a public hearing should be held to provide an opportunity for citizens to address the Board.

Chairman Kyger asked for the Board’s consensus to schedule a public hearing for the Inoperable Vehicles Ordinance on March 25, 2020 with a limit set on the time allotted to discuss the ordinance.

Mr. Miller encouraged citizens to read the ordinance on the County website because there have been rumors about the text in the ordinance that are not true. He said a citizen who was upset read the ordinance and found he was allowed to have five inoperable vehicles on his property (one per acre of land).

Since numerous public hearings were previously scheduled on March 25, 2020, including the Lake Shenandoah Stormwater Control Authority Preliminary Rates, Fees, and Charges Public Hearing, Chairman Kyger asked that the citizens in attendance get together to discuss the ordinance and bring concise, organized concerns and points of view before the Board on March 25, 2020. The purpose of the ordinance is to develop a reasonable measure for County citizens who have an auto graveyard on their property,

without causing issues for other citizens who own antique automobiles that are properly tagged and insured, Chairman Kyger said.

Chairman Kyger stated the Inoperable Vehicles Ordinance Public Hearing will be heard after the other public hearings already scheduled on March 25, 2020, at 7:00 p.m.

In response to a comment from a citizen in the audience that many people do not read the newspaper as they once did, it was noted that the public hearing will be posted on the County’s website and the TV-3 news reporter, who was in attendance, could help spread the word.

Supervisor Chandler recommended that suggestions regarding the ordinance be provided to Administrator King, County Attorney Miller, Mr. Getz or Board members prior to the March 25, 2020 meeting.

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RECESS.

At 3:49 p.m., Chairman Kyger recessed the meeting to allow those in attendance for the Inoperable Vehicles Ordinance to leave the room.

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RECONVENE.

At 3:54 p.m., Chairman Kyger reconvened the meeting.

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COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR'S STAFF REPORT.

The Board received and reviewed Mr. King’s staff report dated March 6, 2020.

Administrator King indicated Deputy Mark Papotnik retired on February 1, 2020, after 25 years of service with the Rockingham County Sheriff’s Office and Jail. Administrator King requested that the Board declare Deputy Papotnik’s service weapon surplus so it may be awarded to him as a retirement gift, in accordance with Virginia Code Section §59.1-148.3.

On motion by Supervisor Chandler, seconded by Supervisor Breeden, and carried by a vote of 5 to 0, voting recorded as follows: BREEDEN – AYE; CHANDLER – AYE; KYGER – AYE; TRUMBO – AYE; WOLFE-GARRISON – AYE; in accordance with Virginia Code Section 59.1-148.3, the Board declared as surplus:

Glock Model 22, Serial #KYY478 – service weapon used by Deputy Papotnik

Deputy Papotnik was not in attendance.

Administrator King indicated the Commissioner of the Revenue received notice from the Commonwealth of Virginia that Branch Banking and Trust Company (BB&T) submitted revised Bank Franchise Tax returns to the Virginia Department of Taxation for years 2012 through 2014. The total refund due to BB&T from Rockingham County is \$13,157.

On motion by Supervisor Chandler, seconded by Supervisor Breeden, and carried by a vote of 5 to 0, voting recorded as follows: BREEDEN – AYE; CHANDLER – AYE; KYGER – AYE; TRUMBO – AYE; WOLFE-GARRISON – AYE; the Board directed the Treasurer to refund \$13,157 to BB&T for the overpayment of Bank Franchise taxes from 2012 through 2014.

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COUNTY ATTORNEY'S STAFF REPORT.

Mr. Miller did not provide a written report, but indicated the need for a closed meeting regarding the acquisition of public property.

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ASSISTANT COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR'S STAFF REPORT.

The Board received and reviewed Mr. Armstrong's Economic Development staff report dated March 11, 2020.

Mr. Armstrong informed the Board that Economic Development and Tourism Coordinator Joshua Gooden was currently touring the County with travel and leisure writers from around the country. The tour was in conjunction with the City of Harrisonburg, and the group was visiting numerous locations, including new amenities at Massanutten Resort, Cave Hill Brewery, the Sipe Center, Sandy Bottom Park golf and miniature golf courses, and venues in Augusta County. Mr. Armstrong hopes the tour will help marketing efforts in the County.

Chairman Kyger stated he likes the three 30-second promotional video clips, and Mr. Armstrong noted the video clips were 100 percent Mr. Gooden's work. Chairman Kyger hopes the Northern Virginia market will be targeted to encourage those residents to visit Rockingham County.

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FINANCE DIRECTOR'S STAFF REPORT.

The Board received and reviewed Mrs. Davidson's staff report dated March 11, 2020. Mrs. Davidson advised the public hearing for the 2020-2021 budget will be advertised March 25, 2020 and April 1, 2020. The public hearing is scheduled on April 8, 2020 at 6:00 p.m. at the County Administration Center. Chairman Kyger noted there will be no tax increase in the 2020-2021 budget.

Administrator King reported that the public hearing will include a proposed nominal increase in water and sewer rates for Smith Creek Water and Sewer Authority for the fiscal year commencing July 1, 2020. The proposed rate increases will align Smith Creek Water and Sewer rates with the rates of other County authorities and districts.

Mrs. Davidson noted the public hearing will also include the budget, capital improvements plan and proposed tax rates.

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HUMAN RESOURCES DIRECTOR'S STAFF REPORT.

The Board received and reviewed Mrs. Mongold's staff report dated March 11, 2020.

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PUBLIC WORKS DIRECTOR'S STAFF REPORT.

The Board received and reviewed Mr. Rhodes' staff report dated March 11, 2020.

Mr. Rhodes indicated water and sewer bills will include a note next month requesting that customers change their address from Harrisonburg to Rockingham. He noted that the Treasurer's Office will include that notation on tax bills mailed in the fall.

Chairman Kyger asked Mr. Rhodes to consider including a statement about completing the U.S. Census, if there is room on the bills.

In response to a question from Supervisor Wolfe-Garrison, Chairman Kyger stated the Census questionnaire information will be mailed to the address listed on the Census data base. He explained that each address will have an identification number that is specific to the United State Postal Service address for that residence, not the people living in the residence. Chairman Kyger indicated the Census will not affect taxes provided to the County for online purchases made by County citizens.

Mr. Dyjak noted that the Census staff worked with the County GIS department to conduct a boundary and annexation survey. They also checked the address of every existing structure, as well as structures to be completed by April 1, 2020.

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COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DIRECTOR'S STAFF REPORT.

The Board received and reviewed Ms. Cooper's staff report dated March 11, 2020. Ms. Cooper reported that the Planning Commission recommended approval of the Capital Improvements Program (CIP) on March 3, 2020, and recommended forwarding it to the Board of Supervisors as presented. The Advisory Subcommittee reviewed project requests during a series of meetings held with department heads and staff, Ms. Cooper said.

Supervisor Trumbo asked if the prevailing wage increase on all public projects passed. He stated the increase should impact the CIP because it is mandated on all County and City work. Chairman Kyger said the County needs to check on the bill Senator Saslaw presented.

Administrator King indicated the County's experience is that contractors typically meet the minimum prevailing wages; the challenge is preparing the documentation for the grant, which increases the price of the project. Supervisor Trumbo noted the County's rates are close to average, but the problem is that companies cannot use apprentices. Each worker has to be a tradesman, which will impact the average wage, Supervisor Trumbo said.

In response to comments from Supervisor Wolfe-Garrison and Administrator King, Supervisor Chandler said the wages would have to be matched, but all workers would not necessarily need to be a tradesman. Supervisor Trumbo confirmed that fact, but indicated the same output would not be produced so costs would increase.

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TECHNOLOGY DIRECTOR'S STAFF REPORT.

The Board received and reviewed Mrs. Perry's staff report dated March 2020.

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FIRE AND RESCUE CHIEF'S STAFF REPORT.

The Board received and reviewed Chief Holloway's staff report dated March 2020.

Administrator King said Chief Holloway attended a meeting at James Madison University (JMU) earlier in the afternoon, and JMU made the decision to extend their spring break one week to March 23, 2020, due to the COVID-19 virus. Students will participate in online classes, where possible. All inside and outside events on the JMU campus (including community events utilizing JMU facilities) are cancelled through April 5, 2020.

Chairman Kyger stated that he and Mr. Dyjak are staying on top of the student Census count at the local colleges and universities.

Chairman Kyger expressed appreciation for the effort the County’s administrative staff and Fire and EMS staff are taking with the COVID-19 issue.

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PREVAILING WAGE INCREASE.

In reference to the prevailing wage increase discussion during the Community Development report, Mr. Miller located a provision regarding the prevailing wage that passed both houses, was signed by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House. The provision requires contractors and subcontractors under any public contractor of the state, with a state agency or with a locality that has adopted an ordinance requiring the payment of prevailing wages. Mr. Miller noted many statutes adopted during this General Assembly session have contained a local option provision, so the County can decide not to opt in.

Chairman Kyger indicated all state contracts will have to pay the prevailing wage rate, but localities can decide not to opt in.

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PARKS & RECREATION DIRECTOR’S STAFF REPORT.

The Board received and reviewed Mr. Dean’s staff report dated March 3, 2020.

Mr. Dean announced the four rotary clubs that assisted with the playground at Rockingham Park at the Crossroads, want to be involved with another park project. Mr. Dean suggested the playground pavilion, which will cost about \$125,000. The rotary is offering funds from the Strawberry Festival, which usually amounts to \$25,000 to \$30,000. In exchange, they would like recognition on the pavilion recognizing the Harrisonburg, Harrisonburg-Massanutten, Bridgewater, and Rockingham Rotary clubs.

Chairman Kyger stated Parks and Recreation can definitely do something to recognize the Ruritan clubs for the donation provided from the Strawberry Festival. He asked Mr. Dean to provide suggestions regarding how the clubs can be recognized.

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COURT SERVICES DIRECTOR’S STAFF REPORT.

The Board received and reviewed Mrs. Freeman’s staff report dated March 11, 2020.

In response to a question from Supervisor Wolfe-Garrison regarding trash pickup, Mrs. Freeman indicated there is a long list of people requesting help. She hopes the pick-up crew can accomplish a lot once the weather is nicer.

Administrator King introduced S. Frank Sottaceti, the newly-hired Criminal Justice Planner for Rockingham County/Harrisonburg City. Mr. Sottaceti indicated he and Mr. King have established a weekly meeting.

Administrator King said in the next few weeks he and Mr. Sottaceti plan to identify what data should be considered. Deputy Director of Technology Bowen is familiar with the data system and will help Mr. Sottaceti determine what information is obtainable. Administrator King said Mr. Sottaceti will also need to determine what groups are comfortable in sharing information.

Administrator King asked that anyone with suggestions contact Mr. Sottaceti to help him develop a plan, since he will be leading the effort to obtain bottom line results. He hopes the results will reduce the number of inmates in the Rockingham County Jail and Middle River Regional Jail, identify changes that need to be made, programs or classes that need to be added, or recognize the facilities are operating appropriately.

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COMMITTEE REPORTS.

The Board heard the following committee reports from Board members and staff:

AIRPORT

Chairman Kyger said flights in and out of Shenandoah Valley Regional Airport continue to be on time.

COMMUNITY CRIMINAL JUSTICE BOARD

Supervisor Chandler stated he and Mr. Sottaceti had a very good first meeting, with lively discussion regarding how to move forward.

FINANCE

On behalf of the Finance Committee, on motion by Supervisor Breeden, seconded by Supervisor Chandler, and carried by a vote of 5 to 0, voting recorded as follows: BREEDEN – AYE; CHANDLER – AYE; KYGER – AYE; TRUMBO – AYE; WOLFE-GARRISON – AYE; the Board approved the following contingency transfer:

FY2019-2020 CONTINGENCY TRANSFER

Technology Server Room Redesign & Replacement of Liebert Unit

The Technology Department submitted a capital improvement request to redesign the data center and move the wiring and racks for efficient use of the space, allowing better access and management, and better cooling and humidity control of all switches and servers. The outdated Liebert air conditioning unit needs to be replaced due to age and the inaccessibility of replacement parts. If the air conditioning unit fails, the room will overheat, causing switch and server failure, as they cannot operate under extreme temperatures. The room reaches 80°F in about 10 minutes. Due to the overheating possibility being greater in the summer, Facilities has gathered quotes for both parts of the project and recommends completing the work in the spring.

The cost of the redesign is about \$11,000 and the cost for the new unit is \$41,350 for an estimated project cost of \$55,000. A transfer from the contingency fund to the Facilities Department is requested in the amount of \$55,000.
